


Stations of the Cross for Children

It is always fun to find a shortcut on the way home from school or the park. Yet, sometimes there is no shortcut and we have to take the long way home.




Jesus, may your punishment free us from sin.


Jesus, lift up our hearts to you when we feel low.


Jesus, may we leave your mark of love on the world.


Jesus, make us proud to walk in your footsteps.


Jesus, help us to lead others to your kingdom.


Jesus, dress us up with the beautiful love of God.


Jesus, we suffer with you so we can heal others.
